### Truck Drivers Circumvent Ban on Rachel Avenue by Using Henshaw

The Camp Washington Community Council received plenty of complaints and the City's Department of Transportation & Engineering (DOTE) placed a No Truck sign at Colerain and Rachel Avenue. Trucks with 3-axes must use Township, one block south.

We quickly discovered that truck drivers turn onto Henshaw from Hopple, circumventing the turn onto Rachel from Colerain (where the no-truck sign is located). DOTE will look into installing another no truck sign on Henshaw.

### Crosley Book Presentation Being Planned

The Camp Washington Business Association is collaborating with the Northside Business Association to host "Crosley: Two Brothers and a Business Empire That Transformed the Nation" book author Rusty McClure at an evening event, possibly at the American Sign Museum.

Set in the vibrant Industrial Age and filigreed with family drama and epic ambition, Crosley chronicles one of the great untold tales of the twentieth century. Born in the late 1800s into a humble world of dirt roads and telegraphs, Powel and Lewis Crosley had unerring knack for knowing what Americans wanted. Their pioneering inventions — from the first mass-produced economy car to the push-button radio — and breakthroughs in broadcasting and advertising made them both wealthy and famous, as did their ownership of the Cincinnati Reds.

The Crosley tower on Arlington is often the first thing drivers see coming west on I-74 to I-75. The re-development of this dilapidated icon will have a huge impact upon the future of Camp Washington.
